COLLEGIUM PHAENOMENOLOGICUM Aristotle: Phusis, Psuchê, Anthrôpos Città di Castello, Italy, July 9–27, 2018



Cameron Coates and Khafiz Kerimov were the outstanding Collegium assistants for the year. As an indication of the abiding philosophical relevance of the ancient Stagirite, the Collegium received the second most applications in its history (second only to María Acosta's year!) and there ended up being students from 13 different countries represented.



Sean D. Kirkland served as the Director of the 39th Annual Collegium Phaenomenologicum. The theme was the thought of Aristotle, and the 41 participants studied Aristotle's thinking of the human being as it emerges out of and perhaps even in opposition to the way of being of natural beings.



Our very own chair, Will McNeill, presented the first week of lectures at the Collegium, accompanied by papers from Richard A. Lee/Christopher Long (DePaul University/Michigan State University), Charlotte Witt (University of New Hampshire), and Françoise Dastur (Université Nice Sophia Antipolis).




WILL MCNEILL AND PHILOSOPHY ALUMNUS



Aesthetic Reason and Imaginative Freedom: Friedrich Schiller and Philosophy was released in


October 2018 and made possible by a URC Research

FANNY SÖDERBÄCK gave the keynote address at the Loyola Graduate Student Conference, Facets of the Tragic. Her paper, "Fantastic Antigones," engaged Sebastián Lelio's 2017 film A Fantastic Woman (Una mujer fantástica),

comparing its protagonist Marina with Sophocles' Antigone. She also gave a plenary session at the annual Kristeva Circle meeting at Cal State Northridge in Los Angeles. Her paper, titled "On Being Stranger than Other Strangers," explored the category of the foreigner in both Julia Kristeva and Gloria Anzaldúa, drawing from the work of Sara Ahmed. Finally, Fanny submitted the final manuscript of her book *Revolutionary Time: On Time and Difference in Kristeva and Irigaray*, which is forthcoming with SUNY Press.






