The DUOS event highlighted the original research being done by both our undergraduates and graduate students.





"Jacob Singer's dissertation is a brilliant and innovative study of Hegel's response to skepticism through a subtle analysis of his treatment of the so-called rules of thought: concepts, judgments, and syllogisms. Jacob argued that Hegel's response to the skeptic's challenges is to account for their very possibility by showing that they are themselves necessarily grounded in more fundamental structures of thought and being. The defense led to profound philosophical discussion for all involved and the committee judged Jacob's work to pass with distinction."

"Dan Perlman's dissertation, "Foucault's Brain: Discourse, Matter, and the Possibility of a Plastic Genealogy," explores the relationship between the genealogical form of historical inquiry and the materiality that it seeks to analyze. Its innovative thesis is that the genealogical method requires a rethinking of its underlying metaphysics, epistemology, and account of resistance to be a truly effective form of historical analysis and that the resources for doing this lie in thinkers such as Karen Barad, Lambros Malafouris, and Catherine Malabou. Dan defended his argument exceptionally well and engaged his critics with both rigor and generosity"

Dr. Paula Landerreche Cardillo



"In her dissertation, Paula elaborates on the complex dynamic between, on the one hand, the repudiation of the body and bodily experience from the political realm, and on the other, the persistence with which bodily metaphors have shaped - and continue to shape - political life as we know it. She offers an in-depth reading of Adriana Cavarero's thinking on these matters, as well as original engagements with a host of other thinkers, from Plato and Immanuel Kant to Luce Irigaray, Santiago Castro-Gómez, Sara Ahmed, Gayatri Chakravorty Spivak, María Lugones, and Cristina Rivera Garza, to mention but a few. It is an ambitious, original, and wide-reaching project, which is bound to become essential reading for those interested in the social construction of embodiment as well as space, the materiality of bodies, and the relationship between these. The methodological frameworks that Paula appeals to in delineating her project - sexual difference feminism (with its roots in a distinctly European context) and decolonial feminisms (particularly as developed by Latin American feminist scholars and activists) - are typically seen as radically different methodological paradigms, and are rarely, if ever, put into productive conversation with one another. Throughout her dissertation, Paula insists not only that they can be read together, but indeed that they should be. Placing these two traditions in a shared space of feminist theory and practice allows her to examine the power of inhabiting and traveling between multiple worlds, and of finding unlikely homes and alliances in the process."


"On Tuesday, June 13, Julian David Rios Acuña defended his disseration, *Genealogy, Colonialism, Violence: Confronting Metaphysical Thinking between and beyond Santiago Castro-Gómez and Michel Foucault.* The two directors, Peg Birmingham and Elizabeth Millán Brusslan, reader, Rafael Vizcaíno, and external examiner, Don Deere, agreed that the work done was pioneering and met the highest standards of scholarship, and so Julian's thesis was granted with distinction. In the thesis Julian offers a detailed analysis of Castro-Gómez's work and places it into conversation with leading figures of the continental philosophical tradition. The focus, as evident from the title, is on the place of genealogical thinking in the work of Castro-Gómez and Foucault, esp. as a tool to reckon with the state violence in Colombia. The committee was most impressed by Julian's ability put the European Continental philosophical tradition into dialogue with not only the Latin American philosophical tradition but also with concrete political realities that continue to shape that tradition, and to do this with impressive clarity and elegance. Congratulations, Julian!"






