^{*}The language curriculum is designed based on the *ACTFL Guidelines* (2012). Learners of a target language need to successfully perform certain language tasks to be considered having achieved a specific proficiency level.

^{**} DCSP offers multiple 4th-year courses that focus on both Chinese language skills and Chinese culture. The nine courses will be rotated each academic year so students who haven't reached near native-speaker proficiency can take up to nine 4th-year CHN courses.

^{***}The 5th-year classes are designed for undergraduate-level students with near native speaker proficiency (who spent enormous amount of time in China or took K-12 education in a Chinese-speaking country/region) and graduate students who must take it as CHN497 to gain deeper knowledge in Chinese culture, linguistics, literature, literary theory, etc. CHN397/497 is a generic course number that can cover a wide range of topics, depending on each professor's expertise and students' interests. Students can take an unlimited number of CHN397/497 courses under the condition that each CHN397/497 has a different topic.
