A LETTER FROM THE CHAIR

As a department, we can truly be proud of the richness and range of accomplishments of our students and faculty.

In addition to those just mentioned, special congratulations are due to a number of other people: In the graduate program, Jeta Mulaj and Bradley Ramos successfully defended their PhD dissertations. In the undergraduate program, Akiva Mattenson was voted Outstanding Senior and his essay was selected for publication in the College's Creating Knowledge journal. Both Akiva and Paola Asturias won our newly inaugurated Excellence in Philosophy award for graduating seniors. Among our faculty, Rafael Vizcaíno won a Center for Latino Research Fellowship and Fanny Söderbäck was awarded a DePaul Humanities Center Fellowship. Congratulations to all!

Meanwhile, I know that many of us will be breathing a collective sigh of relief at having made it through another very challenging and difficult year. I want to thank everyone for their efforts in continuing to keep our department functioning robustly, and I wish everyone a productive and—especially—a recuperative summer.

JENNIFER GAMMAGE's contribution to the Public Philosophy Blog of the APA, "Solidarity, Not Charity: Mutual Aid's An-archic History," was edited by DePaul alumn, Ashley Bohrer. Jennifer examines the historical and contemporary understandings of mutual aid to argue for a dynamic concept of solidarity as an achievement of praxis and to insist upon the revolutionary potential of mutual aid projects.

"Mutual aid can both descriptively refer to a set of practices and prescriptively refer to a philosophical or ethical orientation to practices; that is, mutual aid, like most forms of liberatory thought and action, is best understood as a praxis that requires the ongoing negotiation of action and reflection... So long as mutual aid remains an an-archic form of praxis, it avoids many of the pitfalls of revolutionary movements that depend on charismatic leadership, strict adherence to an ideological framework, or purity politics that alienate and confine multiplicitious personalities, perspectives, and possibilities for living. Mutual aid, as praxis, is neither a doctrine nor a discipline, but a radical orientation toward living with and struggling alongside others in an ever-changing world."

JENNIFER has also been elected chair of the Graduate Student Council of the APA, where she hopes to continue working to support diversity in philosophy.

Additionally, **JENNIFER's** "Not-Being-at-Ease: Ortega on Heidegger's Unheimlichkeit and Anzaldúa's Coatlicue State" was published in *Philosophy Today*'s spring issue along with a response by Mariana Ortega and comments from Jessica Elkayam, a DePaul alumna.

Aerospace Engineer, NASA Scientist, and Mars Perseverance Mission Manager



Jennifer Trosper grew up in rural Ohio listening to her father's stories of working in the space industry in the 1950s. After graduating from high school, she enrolled at MIT and earned a degree in aerospace engineering while minoring in music. She later earned a master's degree in aerospace engineering from USC.


Trosper began her career at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory in 1990. She began her work with the Mars Exploration Program on the Pathfinder mission and has since worked on the Odyssey and Curiosity missions and the Mars Exploration Rover Project. She is currently Deputy Project Manager for Mars 2020 and Project Missions Manager for the Perseverance rover, which landed on the Martian surface in February, and has now led the mission's Ingenuity helicopter in the first-ever powered flight on a world beyond Earth.

Trosper's interests are not limited to space exploration. She is interested in how the arts and humanities can bring important perspectives into the sciences and conversely is also keen to demonstrate why non-scientists should be interested in scientific work.

Nikki Giovanni

Poet, National Book Award Finalist, & Grammy-Nominated Artist



Nikki Giovanni is a poet, essayist, and University Distinguished Professor at Virginia Tech. Her first two collections of poetry appeared in 1968—Black Teeling, Black Talk and Black Judgment—the same year she was awarded a prestigious fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts. Among the manifold collections she has published since are three New York Times and Los Angeles Times Best Sellers, a rare distinction among poets.

Giovanni has practiced an explicitly Black poetics throughout her career and was involved with the Black Arts Movement from its inception as one of

its foremost authors. In 1970 she founded a publishing cooperative, NikTom, to promote the work of Black women writers. She has been involved in activism throughout her career, often appearing on camera to discuss contemporary social and political issues. A seven-time recipient of the NAACP Image Award and the first recipient of The Rosa Parks Women of Courage Award, Giovanni was named one of "25 Living Legends" by Oprah Winfrey in 2005.




