#### WELCOME NEW FACULTY: Andreea Smaranda Aldea

Smaranda earned her Ph.D. at Emory University. She has held research appointments as Postdoctoral Mellon Fellow in Philosophy at Dartmouth College, Leslie Center for the Humanities (2012-2014), Fulbright Finland Research Scholar (2019-2020), and Kone Foundation Finland Senior Research Scholar (2019-2021). Her research interests include: phenomenological methods of inquiry, possibility constitution, experiences of difference, sociality and community, and distinctive forms of consciousness such as imagination, perception, memory, and expectation as well as critical philosophy broadly construed (she recently published an edited volume with Routledge entitled Phenomenology as Critique -Why Method Matters), feminist philosophy, and phenomenological psychopathology.



Smaranda is currently working on two monographs: a project on the imagination as a necessary condition for the possibility of all forms of socio-cultural and political critique and a book on the methodology of transcendental phenomenology understood as radical-immanent critique. Smaranda has recently launched a new book series with Springer, entitled 'New Directions in Phenomenology' – she is also editing the inaugural volume of this new series, which will focus on political phenomenology and emancipatory politics.

When she is not (actively) doing philosophy, she loves to bake sourdough bread (her King Arthur Flour levain is over 200 years old and has been passed down from generation to generation in small New England communities), play with her two black German Shepherds (Mollie and Hektor), paddleboard in the summer and alpine ski in the winter, and talk about movies, music, and good books with her husband James, who is a writer and an award winning mixologist. She is also an avid gardener and hopes to learn more about urban gardening initiatives in Chicago!





#### WELCOME NEW FACULTY: Tuhin Bhatacharjee

Tuhin grew up in Kolkata, India, where he completed his BA and MA degrees, and then worked as a Visiting Lecturer at the University of Calcutta for 3 years. In 2017, he took a giant leap of faith and moved to the US to pursue a doctoral degree in Comparative Literature from New York University. Soon after graduating from NYU in the summer of 2023, he joined the Department of Philosophy at DePaul University as an Assistant Professor.




Tuhin's research and teaching bring together ancient Greek and Indian philosophy, feminist philosophy, queer theory, psychoanalysis, deconstruction, and phenomenology. His current book project comparatively engages maternal figures in ancient Greek and Sanskrit texts to untangle the metaphysics of gender and the politics of reproduction in antiquity. He is also translating Sisir Kumar Das's book *Aloukik Sanglap (Unearthly Dialogues)* from Bengali to English, under contract with a leading university press in India. Tuhin is an Educational Ambassador for *Save Ancient Studies Alliance* (SASA) and a co-editor of *Barricade: A Journal of Antifascism and Translation*. His recent essays have appeared in *philoSOPHIA: A Journal of transContinental Feminism, the Journal of Comparative Literature and Aesthetics*, and the public-facing online journal *Conceptions Review*. When not teaching, writing, or traveling to conferences, Tuhin loves to dabble in photography and the gastronomical arts.










#### Elizabeth Millán Brusslan

In September she presented "Searching for a Deepest Home Where It Isn't: Hearth, Heart, and Healing" at the annual conference for the Pacific Association for the Continental Tradition, September 8-10, 2023, Seattle University WA.

In November she presented "Which Way Brings the One or the Many?: A Question for Buddhists and Meister Eckhart, with Stories of Realization" at the annual conference of the Society for Asian and Comparative Philosophy, November 5 to 11, 2023, University of San Francisco, CA.

She was also a member of the International Focusing Institute's Organizing Committee for the Eugene Gendlin Symposium for Philosophy held from September 28 to October 1, 2023 (opening each day at 6 a.m. U.S. Central Time). This event highlights the contributions of Eugene Gendlin to phenomenology as recognized by leading scholars across the world. Throughout the three and a half day event broadcast globally, she served often as moderator and respondent with her co-organizers (from the Universities of Iceland and of Koblenz) for the twentyfour presentations and other events. The Gendlin Research Center will announce a second Philosophy Prize for young scholars and graduate students in philosophy who wish to engage with this seminal thinker on process thought, the nature of language and communication, and the work of social and inner transformation.







#### Andreea Smaranda Aldea



Smaranda gave a talk in September entitled 'Imagined Embodiment, Hesitation, and the Reflexive Future Perfect: Interrogating the Self-Constituting Power of Gestures' at a conference entitled *Phenomenology and the Limits of Experience* organized by the Romanian Society for Phenomenology and the Philosophy Department at the University of Bucharest.

She also launched, together with Delia Popa (Villanova University) and Christian Ferencz-Flatz (University of Bucharest/Romanian Society for Phenomenology), a new book series with Springer entitled *New Directions in Phenomenology*. The inaugural book project, which she is co-editing with Delia Popa and which is entitled *Doing a Phenomenology of Political Life: Power, Critique, and Social Emancipation*, is under contract and scheduled to appear by the end of 2024/beginning of 2025.



The seminar is designed to support research by both junior and senior scholars alike. *The Transatlantic Phenomenology Research Seminar* will start in February 2024. The topic for the 2024 calendar year is *Own/Alien & Self/Other*. The seminar will meet online once every 6/7 weeks and is open to all. 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#### **Rafael Vizcaíno**



While on research leave, Rafael published an article setting the outlines of what he hopes will be a future book project: a postsecular account of violence in the context of contemporary Mexico. In the interest of growing this project further, he spent almost two weeks at the Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México, where he was additionally invited to speak at a symposium at the Instituto de Investigaciones Filológicas. Upon his return, Rafael presented papers at SPEP and the American Academy of Religion. He is currently in the last stages of finishing his first book manuscript.

#### **Tuhin Bhattacharjee**



Sean Kirkland has recently published his book, *Heidegger and the Destruction of Aristotle: On How to Read the Tradition*. He has received the following praise from Dimitris Vardoulakis, author of *Spinoza*, *the Epicurean: Authority and Utility in Materialism:* 

"This is an astonishing book. Short but to the point, it profoundly challenges ingrained assumptions about Destruktion in Heidegger's early thought and the role that concept fulfills in fundamental texts of philosophy. Sean D. Kirkland is uniquely qualified to tackle this topic, which is an obvious lacuna in the research on Heidegger, and the insightfulness and originality of this work positions him as one of the preeminent scholars of his generation on the subject."




# ROSA MARTINS


# ALMIRA MERT

## Welcome New Graduate Student: Sujitha Parshi





# ALEX STEELE

Born and raised in Eugene, Oregon, I decided to remain in my hometown to complete a BA and MA in philosophy at the University of Oregon. Philosophically, I am interested in the incredibly broad range of questions posed in Ancient Greek philosophy, especially as presented in the Platonic dialogues with their way of displaying the activity of questioning and tasking the reader with this activity's continuation. In this context, one of my abiding questions concerns the nature of philosophical questioning in general and, thus, the meaning of philosophy as a human possibility (even if any given account of this meaning remains perpetually open to other determinations).

I am also interested in Early Modern philosophy and the way in which the goal of the conquest of nature, a project outlined perhaps most explicitly by Bacon and Descartes, marks a wider transformation of previous articulations of basic concepts in Western thought. Specifically, I am interested in how this attempt to supply definitive answers to the questions established on the basis of a preconceived aim of mastery represents one historically significant way of understanding philosophy's purpose, one with effects that reach into our present and stretch into our future.

My general approach to the history of philosophy is informed by the phenomenological and, to some extent, deconstructive traditions of the 20th century.

Fun fact: Before getting into philosophy, I thought I wanted to be a jazz musician... I suppose I traded one improbable career for another!



### SUCCESSFULLY DEFENDED DISSERTATIONS



Jessica Jessen defended her dissertation, "Nietzsche's Ariadne: A New Perspective on the Eternal Recurrence," on Friday, November 3rd. Jessica's dissertation argues that even though she might appear to be a marginal figure within Nietzsche's corpus, the figure of Ariadne is actually much more central to Nietzsche's thought (and particularly his later writings) than has hitherto been recognized. Ariadne, the dissertation demonstrates, is conceived as a solution to the problem of Dionysus and as a parodic figure who opens a perspective on the marginalized within Nietzsche's project of revaluation, including a critique of the philosophical concept of Woman. The committee (director Will McNeill, reader Sean Kirkland, and external examiner Jessica Elkayam of Sam Houston University) was impressed by the originality of both style and content in Jessica's work and passed her dissertation with distinction.




