This is my last message to you as I have come to the end of my second term as Director of the Center for the Black Diaspora. I began this role in July 2019 in a world that's vastly different than the post pandemic one we live in now with daily deportations and wars raging between nations. Throughout these tumultuous years, I have centered programming on: the histories of Black communities and the cultural and spiritual practices that have survived to sustain community in spite of slavery, colonization, and systematic racism; on the transformative and healing power of art, photography, literature, history, religion; and on the intellectual development of our faculty and students and that achieve the Center's mission "to support the production of scholarly, cultural and creative work"; and on working collaboratively with units across this university.

In this academic year, I worked collaboratively on two successful grants:

- a) As part of the Healing Justice Dialogue Series (with myself, Dr. Maria Ferrera, Dr. Ann Russo, and Dr. Susana Martinez), we received \$20,000 from the Healing Illinois Trust to host workshops, symposiums, and presentations on healing and restorative justice.
- b) As a Co-director of the Social Transformation Research Collaborative, I also worked collaboratively to garner \$1.5 million from the Mellon Foundation.

#### 2024-2025 Outcomes for the Mellon Foundation Grant:

I, along with Dr. Margaret Storey and Dr. Billy Johnson Gonzalez, developed the completed the following:

#### **2025 Summer Institute for New Students**

- 1) Met with student and faculty interested in applying for STRC fellowships.
- 2) Weekly planning meetings.
- 3) Selected twenty-four students for the 2025 STRC summer institute
- 4) Coordination between the STRC and Admissions Office to create the Summer Institute application and monitor Slate to coordinate efforts to recruit students.

The Healing Justice Dialogue Series was the second initiative for 2024-2025. This series was developed in 2020 to support the intellectual, spiritual, and health development of DePaul students, faculty, and activists. The Healing Justice Dialogue Series is a collaboration among the Center for Black Diaspora, the Center for Community Health Equity, the Women's Center, and Peace, Justice and Conflict Studies. As a group, we created environments to support dialogue that addresses structural racism and violence and created communities that support healing and restorative justice. As part of the Healing Justice Dialogue Series (with myself, Dr. Maria Ferrera, Dr. Ann Russo, and Dr. Susana Martinez), we used the \$20,000 from the Healing Illinois Trust to host workshops, skill building, symposiums, and presentations on healing and restorative justice. The Center continued its robust programming (please see a full list in this issue of the Annual Report). I want to highlight a couple of specific initiatives:

In 2024, I published Season 4 of the *Black Romance Podcast*, which is building an oral history on Black Romance writers. Season 4 expanded the U.S. centered focus to include Black writers from Africa, the Caribbean, and Britain. With cohost Dr. Carole Bell, each podcast episode highlighted groundbreaking novels that have expanded the domain of romance produced by Black writers – works that speak to the complexity of Black experience across different contexts, time, space, genres, and sites of production. I aired episodes between July and November 2024. (Season 4: 13 episodes). Black Romance Podcast - Podcast - Apple Podcasts.

Thanks to Jennifer Gardner, the Assistant Director of the Center, and Miya Jefferson, the Center's Marketing & Content Development Assistant, for their lead on a couple of important initiatives.

Miya Jefferson developed and hosted one of our Centr'd events titled "Grasping at the Roots." At this event Co-director and Producers Keenan Rhodes and Leah Derray screened and discussed their film Grasping at the Roots, which documents the Black Environmental Justice Movement in the United States.

Jennifer Gardner, CBD's Assistant Director, wrote a proposal and was awarded a Vincentian Fellowship grant to take DePaul students to the National Council for Black Studies' 50<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference in Cincinnati, Ohio. On March 21<sup>st</sup>, 2025, Jennifer moderated a panel of three DePaul scholars who focused on "Perspectives of the African & Black Diaspora: Conjure, Culture, and Community." Panelists included: Naomi Love, Joseph Aidan Tennant, and Kayla Hodges.

Naomi Love's paper, "Redefining Religion: Challenging Eurocentric Narratives Through Conjure," explored the history of Conjure and how it has been used to resist anti-blackness and colonial powers. Naomi's investigation showed the African Diasporic connections between how spiritualists challenge strict boundaries between magic, monotheistic religions, and literature that play a role in African American women's imagination. Joseph Aidan Tennant's paper, "Machine Realism: The Collapse of Bring Chicago Home and Chicago's Radical Black Politics," examined the relationship among 'Bring Chicago Home,' the Black political scene, and community organizing in Chicago. Kayla Hodges' paper titled "Hip-Hop Feminisms: The Femme Rapper's Remix for the Digital Age" examined Hip-Hop's representations of the Black femme experience, America's hyper-capitalist ethos and its alignment with systemic racist practices against Black Creatives in the music industry.

Before I close, I would like to introduce you to the incoming Director of the Center, Dr. Francesca T. Royster, who was selected by CBD's Advisory Board. Dr. Royster is Professor of English at DePaul University. Her books include *Becoming Cleopatra: The Shifting Image of an Icon* (Palgrave MacMillan, 2003), *Sounding Like a No-No: Queer Sounds and Eccentric Acts in the Post-Soul Era* (University of Michigan Press, 2013), *Black Country Music: Listening for Revolutions* (University of Texas Press, 2022), and *Choosing Family: A Memoir of Queer Motherhood and Black Resistance* (Abrams/ Overlook Press, 2023). My thanks to her for accepting this position and thanks to the members of the Center's Advisory Board for your many years of service.







The Social Transformation Research Collaborative (STRC) was established and designed in 2021 by the chairs and directors of the Center for Black Diaspora, the Center for Latino Research, the African and Black Diaspora Department, the Latin American and Latino Studies Department, the Global Asian Studies Minor, the Critical Ethnic Studies Program, and by Dr. Margaret Storey in the Dean's Office in the College of Liberal Arts and Social Sciences.

STRC supports research in the humanities as a source of justice and healing for communities historically shaped by, and continuously facing, racism, violence, and dispossession. Through interdisciplinary research in literature and language, history, and culture, the STRC demonstrates how the humanities deepen our understanding of ourselves and our society and empower us to act, ethically and responsibly, to counter racism, dismantle violence, and build a more just and equitable society.

Our 2024 theme-Anti-Racism, Transformation, and Healing through the Humanities provides a focal point for STRC activities in 2024, including a Summer Institute for incoming DePaul students, quarterly convenings, and a fall conference.

The STRC is generously funded by a three-year grant from The Mellon Foundation.



On Romance: A Conversation with Author Beverly Jenkins and Dr. Carole V. Bell

Beverly Jenkins is the recipient of the 2017 Romance Writers of America Nora Roberts Lifetime Achievement Award, as well as the 2016 Romantic Times Reviewers' Choice Award for historical romance. She has been nominated for the NAACP Image Award in Literature, was featured both in the documentary "Love Between the Covers" and on CBS Sunday Morning. Since the publication of Night Song in 1994, she has been leading the charge for inclusive romance, and has been a constant darling of reviewers, fans, and her peers alike, garnering accolades for her work from the likes of The Wall Street Journal, People Magazine, and NPR.

Carole V. Bell is a Jamaican-born communication researcher, educator, and writer. Her writing has appeared in national media outlets including NPR, The New York Times, The Washington Post, the Los Angeles Times, The Boston Globe, The Atlantic, The Emancipator, Ol Magazine and the Grio. She is also a contributor to the recent Black Love Matters essay

anthology and the co-host, co-creator, and co-producer of season four of the Black Romance Podcast sponsored by the Center for Black Diaspora at DePaul University. Carole's scholarly work has been published in the International Journal of Press/Politics and essay collections including Parasocial Politics: Audiences, Pop Culture, and Politics, and she served as a co-investigator on a project exploring media, race and presidential politics that was funded by the Open Society Foundation. Her book project, The Politics of Interracial Romance in American Film, is a multi-method analysis of the representation, reception, and social and political significance of Black-White romantic narratives in American film since the Civil Rights Movement. She holds a PhD from UNC-Chapel Hill's School of Media and Journalism, a Masters in Television and Radio from Brooklyn College and a Bachelors in English and American Literature from Harvard.

#### KEYNOTE SPEAKER: AUTHOR KARLA CORNEJO VILLAVICENCIO

#### A Conversation with Karla Cornejo Villavicencio and Dr. Lourdes Torres

Karla Cornejo Villavicencio is the author of the National Book Award finalist The Undocumented Americans. Her debut novel, Catalina, is longlisted for the National Book Award. Her work, which focuses on race, culture, and immigration, has appeared in The New York Times, The Atlantic, Vogue, Elle, The New Republic, The Daily Beast, n+1, The New Inquiry, and Interview magazine.

Lourdes Torres is Vincent de Paul Professor of Latin American and Latino Studies at DePaul University where she is also affiliate faculty in Critical Ethnic Studies and Women's and Gender Studies. Her research and teaching interests include sociolinguistics, Spanish in the U.S., and queer Latinidades. She is the author of *Puerto Rican Discourse*: A Sociolinguistic Study of a New York Suburb, co-author of Spanish in Chicago and co editor of Latino Studies: A 20th Anniversary Reader, Third World Women and the Politics of Feminism, and Tortilleras: Hispanic and the Latina Lesbian Expressions. She is currently working on a history of LLEGO, The National Latino/a Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual & Transgender Organization that ran from 1987 to 2004 and advocated for queer Latinx

David Mura is a memoirist, essayist, novelist, poet, critic, playwright and performance artist. Mura's latest book is The Stories Whiteness Tells Itself: Racial Myths and Our American Narratives (2023, U. of MN Press), a collection of essays contrasting historical and fiction narratives by white Americans and African Americans. His last book centered on creative writing and race, A Stranger's Journey: Race, Identity & Narrative Craft in Writing (2018, University of Georgia Press). With essayist Carolyn Holbrook, Mura is co-editor of

University of Georgia rress, Wiln essayist Carolyn holotook, Mura is co-ealior of an anthology of Minnesota BIPOC writers, We Are Meant to Rise: Voices for Justice from Minneapolis to the World (2021, U. of MN Press).

A Sansei or third generation Japanese American, Mura has written two memoirs: Turning Japanese: Memoirs of a Sansei (Grove-Atlantic), which chronicles his year-long stay in Japan and which won a 1991 Josephine Miles Book Award from the Oakland PEN and was listed in the New York Times Notable Books of Year; and Where the Body Meets Memory: An Odyssey of Race, Sexuality and Identity (1996, Anchor/Random). His novel Famous Suicides of the Japanese Empire (2008, Coffee House Press) was a finalist for the Minnesota Book Award, the John Gardner Fiction Prize and Virginia Commonwealth University Cabell First Novelist Award.

Mura's four books of poetry are: The Last Incantations, Angels for the Burning, The Colors of Desire (Carl Sandburg Literary Award from the Friends of the Chicago Public Library) and After We Lost Our Way (1989 National Poetry Series Contest winner. His books of essays include A Male Grief: Notes on Pornography & Addiction and Song for Uncle Tom, Tonto & Mr. Moto: Poetry & Identity (U. of Michigan Press Poets on Poetry series, 2002).


