Second Biannual Pan-African Catholic Congress on Theology, Society, and Pastoral Life:

"Walking Together for a Vital Church in Africa and in the World"

July 18-22 Catholic University of Eastern Africa (CUEA) Nairobi

Organized by the Pan-African Catholic Theology and Pastoral Network (PACTPAN—an outgrowth of CWCIT's African Catholicism network begun in 2017—and cosponsored by CWCIT, this event gathered over 100 pastoral leaders and interdisciplinary scholars from more than 20 African countries and five continents. It was PACTPAN's second congress; the first was held in December

As the *National Catholic Reporter* reported in an August 11, 2022 article, the event included "sessions on domestic violence, war, economic and ecological crises, child sexual abuse, human trafficking and more—all against the backdrop of the Vatican's revamped global synodal process."

Becoming a Church of the Poor: The Vincentian Charism and Reform

For the first time since 2019, our speakers gathered in person, and we held our **first hybrid conference** to address the question: How can the Vincentian charism contribute to the reform process Pope Francis has begun and help make the Church more open to God and to the poor?

They came together in Chicago from the Philippines, Chile, Haiti, Brazil, Indonesia, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Nigeria, Argentina, the U.S., and Europe to discuss the following topics:

- Historical perspectives on reform in the lives of St. Vincent de Paul, St. Louise de Marillac, Blessed Frederic Ozanam, and Vincentian communites worldwide
 - The changing concept of "the poor" and the theme of marginality
 - The internal reform of the Church, including the roles of laity and women
 - Becoming an outward-facing Church dedicated to transforming the world





Handbook of African Catholicism Receives Award






