A noted peace and human rights advocate, Amina Rasul Bernardo is president of the Philippine Center for Islam & Democracy (PCID) and managing trustee of the Magbassa Kita Foundation, Inc (MKFI), which promotes literacy for peace & development for adult learners. She is a member of the Board of Regents of Mindanao State University (MSU) and board member of the Mindanao Development Authority (MinDA).

She also serves as a member of the National Independent Advisory & Monitoring Committee (NIAMC) Department of Social Welfare & Development's Conditional Cash Transfer Program as well as on the Criminal Investigation & Detection Group (CIDG) General Advisory Council. She is a Ramon Magsaysay Award Foundation Board of Trustee.

A columnist for *BusinessWorld*, she has written & edited several books on the Mindanao conflict, Islam, and democracy such as *Broken Peace? Assessing the 1996 GRP-MNLF Final Peace Agreement* and *The Radicalization of Muslim Communities in Southeast Asia*. She was the launching editor of *The Moro Times*, a monthly supplement of *The Manila Times*. She holds a bachelor's degree in economics from the University of the Philippines, an MBA from the Asian Institute of Management, and a master's in public administration from Harvard's Kennedy School of Government.

She was a member of the Philippine cabinet under former president Fidel V. Ramos, serving as presidential advisor on Youth Affairs and appointed concurrently as the first chair of the National Youth Commission (NYC), which she organized. In addition, she has served as commissioner of the National Commission on the Role of Filipino Women, representing Muslims; as a board member of the Philippine National Oil Corporation (PNOC) and the Development Bank of the Philippines (DBP); and as founding director of the Local Government Guarantee Corporation (LGGC). She is a founding member of Women in International Security (Philippines) and Muslim Women Peace Advocates (Sulu). In 2007, she received the Muslim Democrat of the Year Award from the Washington, DC-based Center for the Study of Islam and Democracy (CSID).
